Notes from Roundtable Discussion Prevention Education Workers/Managers Training – March 1 & 2, 2011

Issues of interest, what did you like about the training, etc:

- Liked workshops and liked the collaboration between the two groups
- There are differences between rural and urban and some of that was addressed and acknowledged
- Glen and Chuck's presentation, it was relevant, should we as a group be advocating for this model provincially?
- Current flavour – tech. knowledge framework, STOP HIV/AIDS is the driver
- Relational practice, client-centred practice
- Balance and counter balance – two sides, but relational practice is a critical component
- Networking – sharing, information exchange
- Fun
- Terry's catalogue, important and interesting
- What about a contact distribution list?
- ROR/PAN partnered – good, important, was scheduled well between the two groups
- Supporting each other is good
- STOP – Aboriginal voice is not being heard, not education focused, or very little education focused, this is important and needs to be kept alive
- Young people engaged in the work, this is important, health promotion, empowerment
- Social justice, marginalized people
- Community health – CBO's play a vital role in the continuum, this often gets forgotten, don't let it be forgotten
- Partnerships, they're important – each have strengths, sharing, competition for the piece of the pie can cloud things, but partnering and sharing is important
- Unification
- Influencing public policy, community can play a big role in this
- Youth voice, nice, thankful of appreciation, and it goes the other way too
- Public policy discussions - priorities, being proactive, and what actions can be taken
- Lack of funding to do this, all of this
- How can we support, maintain, people, youth, etc, not wanting to lose people and having to re-train, etc.
- Gay men, queer community, their involvement, important
- Sex, talking about sex, how do we do this, what's the best way to talk about sex
- Forum theatre, for a possible future topic
- Rainbow of Desire – Headlines Theatre
- More circles, like the one we're in right now
- Round tables, dialogue, issues, range of issues
- Poz people, their voices at the table, this is important, good to have them at an educators skills building
- Tools, a repository of tools or a toolbox, best practices (Terry Howards project, CATIE), could PAN do this?
- CATIE (Programming Connection), CAAN, toolboxes
- PHAC – call for proposals coming - heads up
- The Community Readiness Model presentation by OAAS in the ROR session, excellent

- Point of care testing, pilots happening in Vancouver at community groups, what does this mean for the future, how will it shape and change things
- Social media, (also need to discuss privacy issues, etc), how can we make it work for us?
