Dear Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada:

I am ashamed to learn that Canada is a world leader in the criminalization of HIV non-disclosure. This is not the reputation that I have come to expect of this country.

While I understand that the criminalization of HIV non-disclosure was originally intended to protect individual health, in reality it poses a significant danger to individual and public health by discouraging HIV testing and treatment, and compromising relationships with healthcare providers. The overly-broad prosecution of HIV non-disclosure not only inflicts stigma, violence, marginalization, and discrimination on women living with HIV, it also disregards established scientific evidence. Condoms, when intact and used properly, are 100% effective at preventing HIV transmission. When a person's HIV viral load is undetectable, HIV is untransmittable. Compulsory HIV disclosure can grievously endanger persons living with HIV due to pervasive stigma and discrimination.

Canada has been a world leader in protecting women's rights and promoting gender-sensitive policies. Ending the criminalization of HIV non-disclosure using the law of sexual assault is unfinished business on Canada's feminist agenda. As long as women living with HIV suffer uncertainty, violence, and fear due to the criminalization of HIV nondisclosure, Canada cannot respectably assume a position of moral authority or feminist leadership on the world stage.

I urge you to work with your colleagues in Parliament, your provincial counterpoints, and alongside community members toward decriminalizing HIV non-disclosure in all but the very rare cases of actual and intentional transmission.
